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



Ministry of Health

The Ministry of Health is responsible for regulating and providing health services for British Columbia residents. Several branches within the Ministry of Health focus specifically on the health of older adults. These include the Seniors' Services Division, and the Office of the Seniors Advocate. Within the Seniors' Services Division, Community Care Supports is responsible for assisted living and community care licensing and rates, while the Seniors' Services Branch oversees the provision of government funded home care, long term care and assisted living services. Older adults also access a range of other services and benefits that are regulated by or provided through the Ministry of Health.



Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction

The Ministry for Social Development and Poverty Reduction provides programs and financial supports to assist British Columbians who have low incomes or live with physical or cognitive incapacities. Some supports and programs, such as the B.C, Seniors Supplement, are provided specifically for older adults. Older adults are also eligible for many supports and programs provided for people facing physical or cognitive challenges, including accessing Health Supplements and programs provided through the B.C. Employment and Assistance Program.

Provincial Priorities/New Initiatives/Announcements

The following section comprises a review of recent government announcements and budgets that have dedicated resources and action to improving programs, policy, and services offered to older adults in British Columbia. These priorities span both government departments highlighted above.

Financial Supports

- As part of the 2019 TogetherBC Poverty Reduction Strategy, the Ministry of Health introduced the Fair Pharmacare Program, which included eliminating drug co-payments for older adults born before 1940 earning a net annual income of \$14,000 or less.¹³
- In the 2020 Mandate Letter to the Minister of Social Development and Poverty Reduction, the Minister was directed to build on the province's Poverty Reduction Plan. 14
- The 2021 budget announced \$1.6 billion to provide supports for people receiving income and disability assistance including low-income older adults.¹⁵
 - The B.C. Senior's Supplement increased by \$50/month and an estimated additional 20,000 older adults would become eligible.^{16,17}

Housing

- The 2019 TogetherBC Poverty Reduction Strategy announced investment of \$1.9 billion over 10 years for B.C. Housing to construct 14,000 affordable rental homes, including some for older adults.¹⁸
 - o B.C. Housing also increased the monthly payment through the Shelter Aid for Elderly Renters (SAFER) program by \$78 to \$265/month.
- The 2021 Budget announced increased funding for new affordable housing units, which includes units for older adults.¹⁹
 - o The Home Owner Grant program was increased by \$275 for people over age 65.

Healthcare Human Resources

- The 2020 Mandate Letter to the Minister of Health directed the Minister to aim to hire 7000 staff in long-term care and assisted living through the Health Career Access Program.²⁰
 - The 2022/23-2024/25 Service Plan drafted by the Ministry of Health set out the goal of funding individual LTC homes to reach minimum 3.36 direct care hours per day for each resident.²¹

- The 2021/22 2023/24 budget announced funding of \$68 million over 3 years to increase staffing for home care.²²
 - It also allocated \$585 million for recruiting, training, and hiring 3000 health care workers for long-term care and assisted living.
 - The funding for hiring and training was accompanied by legislative changes to care home working conditions and repealed legislation that promoted workforce privatization.²³
- The 2022 Healthcare Human Resources Strategy identified older adults' health as a priority.²⁴
 - o It highlighted allocating since 2017 over \$1 billion to health care workers.
 - Those allocations include hiring over 7000 staff for older adults' health care, including more than 3500 Health Care Assistants who were participants in the Health Care Access Program implemented in collaboration with the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training, Health Authorities, WorkBC, Indigenous organizations, health sector unions and other groups. The Strategy stated that the Ministry of Health expects there will be 9000 Health Care Access Program participants by April 2024.

Healthcare Infrastructure

- The 2020 Mandate letter and 2022/23-2024/25 Service Plan for the Ministry of Health directed the Ministry to work toward eliminating multi-bed rooms in health-authority owned long-term care facilities.²⁵²⁶
 - The Ministry of Health also plans to build more public care homes with additional beds, and increase accountability of publicly funded private long-term care facilities.
- The 2021 Budget announced \$12 million to support a Home Health Monitoring Initiative.²⁷

Health Service Delivery

- In the 2022/23-2024/25 Service Plan, the Ministry of Health set several service delivery improvement goals. These include:
 - Improving the range of supports for people in LTC
 - Expanding community-based care models and digital solutions, such as the CareConnect electronic health record system
 - Improving integrated team and community-based care for older adults with complex needs
 - Improving access to end-of-life care
 - Engaging with community and Indigenous partners to provide supports for older adults in the community.²⁸

- The 2022 Health Human Resources Strategy includes the goal of enabling older adults to age in their homes and communities; important supports are integrated primary care and community-based services. Four areas of focus related to older adults' health include:
 - o 1. promoting healthy living supports for older adults
 - 2. Access to team-based primary care
 - 3. Access to home health services
 - 4. Strengthening the quality of long-term care.²⁹

COVID-19 Control

- The Ministry of Health 2020 Mandate letter directed the Minister to continue with COVID-19 measures to protect older adults.³⁰
- The 2021 Budget announced an additional \$900 million for COVID-19 control measures.³¹ There Include:
 - Ongoing screening of staff at long-term care.³²
 - Prioritized vaccination of older adults and staff in care homes.
- Between April and December 2020, the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction provided a \$300/month COVID-19 Crisis Supplement to B.C. residents who received income assistance or the B.C. Seniors' Supplement.³³
- The Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction 2020 Mandate Letter directed the Minister to respond to challenges presented by COVID-19 and support inclusive recovery.³⁴
 - The Crisis Supplement was discontinued after December 2020. However, a permanent \$50/month increase was made to the B.C. Seniors' Supplement.

Mental Health and Addictions Supports

- The 2020 Mandate Letter to the Minister of Health directed the Minister to work with government and community partners to develop a Silver Alert system to help locate missing older adults, especially those with dementia of Alzheimer's disease.³⁵
- The 2021 Budget announced \$39 million for mental health and addictions supports, including for older adults.³⁶
